S.1 Admission, Orientation Activities & Healthy School Life

<p>Secondary One Admission</p> <p>Our school will accept discretionary places. Our school will participate in the Secondary School Places Allocation System through central allocation stage (Applicable for admission to S1 in September 2017). Conduct (15%), Academic Potential (20%), Ability to use English as the medium of learning (35%), Communication Skills (15%) and others (sports, service and religion) (15%).</p>
<p>Orientation Activities and Healthy Life</p> <p>All newly admitted S1 students need to attend the Bridging Programme in July, which prepares them to adopt English as the medium to learn. Different learning support measures are also provided for S1 students, which include small-class instruction and a school-based curriculum called Learning Skills Across Curriculum. Apart from arranging S4 Guidance Prefects to help S1 students adapt to their school life, the school organizes talks for parents on a regular basis to enhance their understanding of the school core values and their child's learning progress. Our formal curriculum includes such topics as home and occupational safety, nutrition, food and personal hygiene, balanced diets and physical training. The Guidance Team organizes seminars on sex education and mental health across all levels. To highlight the importance of developing a healthy lifestyle, all students do exercise together in the school playground in the morning assembly every Monday.</p>

School Management Organisation

School's Key Concerns:

School Management Organisation:

The school values teamwork and encourages teachers to take part in school administration. The Central Coordination Committee is set up to coordinate the work of all committees, to implement the school major concerns and to execute school-based management. The Incorporated Management Committee comprises teachers, alumni and parents, which facilitates communication between the school and stakeholders as well as formulation of school plans. The School Administrative Committees include Academic, Student Affairs, Extra-curricular Activities, Professional Development, Spiritual Life, Information Technology and General Affairs.

Incorporated Management Committee / School Management Committee / Management Committee:

The School Management Committee comprises the school principal, members from the sponsoring body, teacher representative, parent representative, one alumni representative and an independent member.

School Green Policy:

The school is committed to raising students' environmental awareness. There are certain measures which help create a green campus. Firstly, general guidelines for energy saving have been issued. To maximize energy saving without significant reduction in comfort level, a room temperature at 26 degrees Celsius should be maintained. Secondly, students are reminded to cut down on consumption of disposable items during such school activities as picnic or Christmas celebration. In addition to placing designated recycling bins at school, facsimiles are received by electronic means.

Learning and Teaching Plan

Whole-school Language Policy:

To prepare our students for tertiary education and better career opportunities, our school adopts English as the medium of instruction in all subjects and all classes except Religious Education, Liberal Studies, Extended Curriculum, Life Education and Physical Education. Our school also provides an authentic and language-rich environment for students to enhance their language proficiency.

Learning and Teaching Strategies:

The school attaches great importance to teaching effectiveness. To enhance the quality of learning and teaching as well as the professional competence of teachers, collaborative lesson preparation, lesson observation and staff training are regularly conducted. The school endeavours to offer a rich learning experience for students to acquire skills and knowledge, while developing a positive outlook on life, through a school-based programme, Extended Curriculum. The S1 curriculum focuses on self-development and resistance through a series of adventure-based training programmes arranged by SHUN Teens. The S2 curriculum focuses on community service, in which students develop a spirit of serving the community and strengthen their sense of responsibility. The S3 curriculum guides students to plan their future through a series of career talks.

School-based Curriculum:

1. Electives: 2X and 3X. Senior secondary students are given the choices of studying two electives or three electives for HKDSE.
2. Curriculum highlights: A number of subjects have their school-based curriculum, namely, Integrated Humanities, Life Education, Learning Skills Across Curriculum as well as Technology and Living. To stretch students' potential, some after-school classes are also provided for students such as English Debating Workshops, English Writing and Speaking Workshops, as well as Mathematics Enhancement Classes.

Development of Key Tasks:

Aiming to strengthen students' self-learning skills and cultivate a rich reading atmosphere on campus, our school allocates two periods a cycle to reading. In Reading to Learn lessons, students are encouraged to select books they enjoy reading and set goals before they embark on their reading journey. Inspiring interaction between teachers and students through book sharing not only adds pleasure to reading, but also motivates students to read for both intellectual and spiritual nourishment. To create a stronger reading atmosphere, Extensive Reading Scheme, Holiday Reading Scheme and book sharing sessions are incorporated into the curriculum.

To nurture students into active learners, Project Learning across KLA's becomes the backbone of junior secondary education. Students gain first-hand experience in data collection, field trips, research and conducting interviews. This prepares students for their Independent Enquiry Study (IES) in senior secondary education.

IT for Interactive Learning: The wide use of intranet is proven conducive to learning and teaching. E-learning platforms for Chinese, English and Integrated Humanities have been in place to encourage learning beyond classrooms. Besides, to keep parents and other stakeholders abreast with school events and important news, the school website is updated on a regular basis and is highly informative.

Moral & Civic Education: Through assemblies and class teachers' periods, the school promotes national, moral, environmental and health education. A healthy campus is established in which students develop healthy habits and a positive outlook on life. Student ambassadors are recruited to organize campus-wide activities.

Life Planning:

Career Guidance Team offers ample support for students to make well-informed decisions in their NSS subject selection and post-secondary education, and instills in students the significance of career and life planning so that they can strategize their all-important life choices.

S1 and S2 students are prompted to make a self-reflection and examine the roles of multifarious careers in today's world. S3 students are given talks to understand various NSS subjects and entry requirements of university programmes.

To prepare senior secondary students for the future, different learning activities are organized to facilitate their career and life planning. Company visits, job shadowing programmes, school-company partnership programmes and school-based Mock job interviews for S6 are a few examples to show our students a true picture of the working world. With some effective career assessment tools, students are inspired to explore the correlation between personal aptitudes and career choices.

Each S5 and S6 student is assigned a teacher mentor from whom timely and useful advice on post-secondary education is dispensed. Prior to JUPAS application, students are offered two individualized meetings with career teachers.

Our alumni also contribute their generous support through their sharing in school talks on university application and interview skills and mentoring some of our S5 students for their development.

Student Support

Whole School Approach to Catering for Student Diversity:

Student Support Team has been set up to cater for the special educational needs of students. A whole school approach is adopted with the professional support from educational psychologists and school social workers. Apart from two class teachers system, we run remedial and elite classes to help students achieve more. We also encourage students with special talents to participate in gifted programmes and exchange programmes.

Measures to provide adaptation for Learning and Assessment:

The school puts emphasis on the learning process of students. In addition to test and examination results, we assess students' classroom and homework performance.

<p>Home-School Co-operation: The PTA acts as a bridge between parents, teachers and students . Apart from organizing day camp for students as well as offering administrative support for S1 Registration, the PTA holds seminars and workshops for parents . Some enthusiastic parents become the instructors of the Hong Kong Adventure Corps or the Hong Kong Award for Young People, playing an active role in organizing training sessions for students .</p>
<p>School Ethos: The core values of our school are: Love, Mutual Respect and Responsibility. The school aims at promoting family-based school ethos in a caring and supportive environment. Discipline Team, the Guidance Team, class teachers and parents work closely for the betterment of students' growth . To facilitate communication, the school holds "family meetings" in which students are invited to voice their opinions on school policies or affairs.</p>
